Love inspires the anger That curses poverty, Preaches Life's enrichment, Seeks equality.

Love inspires the anger That still can set us free From the world's conventions Bringing liberty.

Let us worship God.

Our hymn today is 'Show me how to stand for justice.

A Prayer

Eternal God, at the start of this day, set apart and sacred we come to worship. We are joined virtually and by the bonds of long-standing friendship. A Prayer of Confession

This comes from the URC Prayer handbook for today. Let us pray

When we put conditions on how to worship, when the instruction manual becomes our gospel, when we put obstacles in the path of those who would come to you.

Forgive us.

Your anger in the temple shows us how much you care: that everyone is welcome that you are wherever we are.

You are love unlimited, always accessible. We are grateful that we can turn to you in the dead of night; from the depths of our lowest moments, and know we will find love, understanding, comfort and acceptance, just as we are. Amen

Some thoughts

It was the same, year after year, every Temple visit he saw the same thing – and it sickened him, and it made him angry, but now he could do something about it.

Bonhoeffer said that 'people who love are the most revolutionary people on earth' and what happened here — was borne out of love, there was anger as well, but it was sorrowful anger, anger at what this had become, which was not what it had intended. It could not be business as usual, and what was happening here was very much 'business' where was God?

That same God who was their reason for being at the Temple, a place of worship, not a market-place.

A place of prayer that needed to be purged and restored to its true purpose.

A place for Passover where God had been passed -over In favour of making a profit.

It was Jesus' love of the Father and his love for the people that drove him to act as he did, it was a righteous anger borne out of love and sorrow at what the Temple had become.

"You have to change; you have to become more God-focussed" less self, more sacrificial, less profit motivated, more people motivated.

Church and market have often collided, but rarely colluded;
The church frowns on money making enterprises, but keeps a watchful eye on the interest rate of the deposit account.
As congregations we acquire much, but are loathe to clear out, 'just in case.'

The Jews saw the Temple as the spot where heaven and earth touched, imagine their horror at the threat of its destruction,

but imagine the joy that would be theirs in finding and knowing each other as the body of Christ.

But they had to let gode-clutter, re-focus, evaluate and understand, and leave behind, strip back all that put a barrier between them and God.

Love and anger are closely linked;
The cathartic aspect of loving anger
Is not to be underestimated.
Read those verses once again;
imagine Jesus walking into our church buildings.
what would his reaction be?
Amen

We continue our worship with Bruce Springsteen's Rocky Ground.

Before you wonder where I am going with this, please listen to the words in the light of our gospel today.

and all the emotions currently felt.

Hard times come no more, We pray for all who trust and hope and believe that better days lie ahead and proclaim that belief encountering disbelief in return.

You pray for guidance only silence meets your prayers, we've been travelling over rocky ground, Living Lord, in your time not ours, by your grace, not ours; by no rights of our own, but through your love we make these prayers.
